Description of Certified Project:

This project consists of the FERC License application and outlines plans to construct a new concrete intake structure, rubber dam, low profile powerhouse and the relocation of the Cross Cut Canal headworks at the Chester Diversion Site in Fremont County, Idaho. The new intake structure will include a log way trash chute to prevent debris entry and damage to the turbine areas.

Certification:

This water quality certification is issued under the authority of Section 401 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act and its Amendments (Clean Water Act) and IDAPA 58.01.02. This certification is in response to the Symbiotics, LLC.'s request for certification dated May 24, 2004. DEQ has reviewed the application submitted to FERC for the license and hereby certifies pursuant to section 401 of the clean water act that, provided the facility operates as described in the application, there is a reasonable assurance the proposed project will comply with applicable requirements of section 301, 302, 303,306 and 307 of the Clean Water Act and the Idaho Water Quality Standards.

This § 401-certification decision may be appealed pursuant to the Idaho Environmental Protection and Health Act, Idaho Code § 39-107(5) and the Idaho Administrative Procedure Act. Such an appeal is a prerequisite to any district court action and must be initiated by filing a petition for a contested case in accordance with the Rules of Administrative Procedure before the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) Board (IDAPA 58.01.23) within thirty-five (35) days of the date of DEQ's decision regarding the 401 certification.
