Dear Maryalice,

Lock+<sup>TM</sup> Hydro Friends Fund XLII, LLC (HFF) is providing responses for the items noted in the Intake Review of our Application dated July 19, 2021.

LIHI already has the updated Threatened and Endangered species information in #1 below. Please note the correction in item #3 below. LIHI also has the map of the dams referenced in item #4 below.

 Based on documentation developed during project licensing (please refer to the FERC EA), as well as updated USFWS species information for the project area generated on February 23, 2022, only the federally listed Indiana bat and Northern long-eared bat (NLEB) have potential ranges that overlap with the project area. There are no federally listed fish or mussel species documented within the project affected reach.

USFWS established a final rule under section 4(d) of the Endangered Species Act that provides measures for the conservation of NLEB. The prohibits the take of NLEB from certain activities within areas where they are in decline. This incidental take protection applies only to known NLEB occupied maternity roost trees and known NLEB hibernacula. Effective February 16, 2016, incidental take resulting from tree removal is prohibited if it 1) occurs within a <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile radius of known NLEB hibernacula; or 2) cuts or destroys known occupied maternity roost trees, or any other trees within a 150-foot radius from the known maternity tree during the pup season (June 1-July 31).

Project operations do not include any cutting of trees even if there were roost trees within the project boundary.

An updated PA Natural Heritage review was conducted for the Lower Monongahela watershed on February 23, 2022 which showed a single difference from what was reported in the original LIHI application, namely the river shiner fish is listed as state-endangered but only in the online list of species of concern not the threatened and endangered species list.

2. The PA Fish and Boat Commission has Threatened and Endangered listed species in the project reach. The species identified in the map below are one or more of the same species included in our LIHI Application with the possible addition of river shiner as mentioned above in #1.

Project operation is unlikely to affect these species as mentioned previously. Lastly, no agencies commented during the Pre-Licensing or Licensing process (a period of over 4 years) on fish entrainment in the FERC EA.

- 3. The downstream extent of the project reach is at the confluence of Homestead Run, not Turtle Creek which enters just upstream of the lock/dam.
- 4. Maps of upstream/downstream dams are in both our FERC License application and available online from the Army Corps of Engineers.

## Probability of Presence Summary

The graphs below provide our best understanding of when birds of concern are most likely to be present in your project area. ### Probability of Presence (

Each green bar represents the bird's relative probability of presence in the 10km grid cell(s) your project overlaps during a particular week of the year. (A year is represented as 12 4-week months.) A taller bar indicates a higher probability of species presence. The survey effort (see below) can be used to establish a level of confidence in the presence score. One can have higher confidence in the presence score if the corresponding survey effort is also high.

How is the probability of presence score calculated? The calculation is done in three steps:

1. The probability of presence for each week is calculated as the number of survey events in the week where the species was detected divided by the total number of survey events for that week. For example, if in week 12 there were 20 survey events and the Spotted Towhee was found in 5 of them, the probability of presence of the Spotted Towhee in week 12 is 0.25.

- 2. To properly present the pattern of presence across the year, the relative probability of presence is calculated. This is the probability of presence divided by the maximum probability of presence across all weeks. For example, imagine the probability of presence in week 20 for the Spotted Towhee is 0.05, and that the probability of presence at week 12 (0.25) is the maximum of any week of the year. The relative probability of presence on week 12 is 0.25/0.25 = 1; at week 20 it is 0.05/0.25 = 0.2.
- 3. The relative probability of presence calculated in the previous step undergoes a statistical conversion so that all possible values fall between 0 and 10, inclusive. This is the probability of presence score.

To see a bar's probability of presence score, simply hover your mouse cursor over the bar.

### Breeding Season (=)

Yellow bars denote a very liberal estimate of the time-frame inside which the bird breeds across its entire range. If there are no yellow bars shown for a bird, it does not breed in your project area.

### Survey Effort (|)

Vertical black lines superimposed on probability of presence bars indicate the number of surveys performed for that species in the 10km grid cell(s) your project area overlaps. The number of surveys is expressed as a range, for example, 33 to 64 surveys.



## Tell me more about conservation measures I can implement to avoid or minimize impacts to migratory birds.

### Data limitations

The Service's objective of mapping wetlands and deepwater habitats is to produce reconnaissance level information on the location, type and size of these resources. The maps are prepared from the analysis of high altitude imagery. Wetlands are identified based on vegetation, visible hydrology and geography. A margin of error is inherent in the use of imagery; thus, detailed on-the-ground inspection of any particular site may result in revision of the wetland boundaries or classification established through image analysis.

The accuracy of image interpretation depends on the quality of the imagery, the experience of the image analysts, the amount and quality of the collateral data and the amount of ground truth verification work conducted. Metadata should be consulted to determine the date of the source imagery used and any mapping problems.

#### Data exclusions

These habitats include seagrasses or submerged aquatic vegetation that are found in the intertidal and subtidal zones of estuaries and nearshore coastal waters. Some deepwater reef communities (coral or tuberficid worm reefs) have also been excluded from the inventory. These habitats, because of their depth, go undetected by aerial imagery.






Figure 4. Navigation Project Locations in the Watershed.
